Igniting Teenagers' Interest in Parks, Trails and Mountain Biking

Nine teenagers graduated from the Trail Ambassador Program in July 2022. For their hard work building and clearing trails, they each received a mountain bike, made possible through funding from the Montgomery Parks Foundation, along with a helmet, bike lock and certificate. The program's immediate positive impact has since multiplied ... just as Montgomery Parks had hoped.

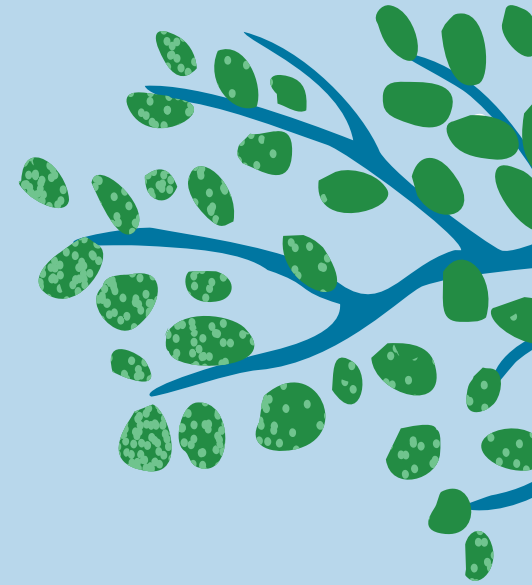
“Friendships were made. They were tight. Many still keep in touch,” said Jim Corcoran (second from right), who interacted daily with the teenagers as he ran the program.

HELEN MESFIN, Trail Ambassador graduate, knew little about Montgomery Parks prior to the program. “I honestly didn’t know we had parks. I didn’t know we had trails, so it was a whole new experience.”

Inspired by Montgomery Council member, Craig Rice, “The Trail Ambassador Program was created with the aim to increase diversity in the mountain biking community and reduce barriers to trail usage in historically underserved communities,” explains Jim Corcoran, Montgomery Parks’ Trails Volunteer and Community Partnerships Coordinator. Service learning and recreation were the two main components of the program.

Over the two-week pilot program, the nine high school teenagers cut branches and picked up sticks to clear trails each morning. Working as a team, they learned about trail tools, safety and maintenance; as well as, how much their service efforts meant to other trail users. Afterwards, they rode bikes. As their knowledge grew, so too did their levels of confidence, friendships and bike-riding skills.

Helen Mesfin was so thrilled to share her positive experience with friends; especially as many thought she was “insane” to pursue mountain biking -- an activity so far out of her experience and comfort zone, prior to the program.

“After the two weeks,” said Helen, “I explained what I did. I took them on the trail. I took them to Sligo and then to the Rock Creek Trail. They were surprised as well. They didn’t think it would be that much fun!”



INCLUSION FOR ALL

Boards Enable Everyone to Communicate, Play and Learn!

South Germantown SplashPark's communication board, the latest of four boards installed by Montgomery Parks, gives people of all ages and backgrounds the ability to easily communicate.

SOUTH GERMANTOWN Recreational Park SplashPark and Mini-Golf introduced park patrons to their communication board in May 2022. Made possible by a grant from Walmart Giving, the board stands out on a bright blue wall, immediately upon entering the SplashPark. "This one is especially unique; it is the first one that has American Sign Language images," explains Jennene Blakely, Program Access Manager, Montgomery Parks.

People who have autism, who are recovering from a stroke or brain injury, who are non-verbal, or who have learning and/or developmental disabilities may have limited language skills. A communication board empowers these individuals to communicate their needs and desires by gesturing to a series of pictures or symbols to relay a simple message.

Who brought the idea of communication boards to Montgomery County Parks? Laura McAteer, a Montgomery County resident and retired physical therapist who worked with children who are non-verbal, recognized a "fantastic idea" when she heard one. After her sister-in-law informed her that a park in West Virginia installed a communications board, Laura brought the concept to Montgomery Parks.

Dedicated to park access and inclusion for all, Montgomery Parks has also established communication boards in Wheaton Regional Park Adventure Playground (April 2022), Wheaton Local Park (July 2021) and

South Germantown Recreational Park Playground (October 2021).

Feedback has been very positive. Parents of children who are non-verbal have expressed their gratitude. Jennene Blakely says interest in these boards has spread, "we've received a lot of phone calls from organizations and agencies across the country who are interested in our Communication Boards, and in using our tools and contacts as their model. We are proud to be paving the way."



FULFILLING OUR PARKS' NEEDS

Weed Warriors Battle Serious Threat to Our Parks

Many homeowners combat lawn weeds; yet very few can call themselves a “weed warrior.” Weed Warriors work beyond their yards, volunteering their time and effort to address a serious threat to the health of our parks.



NOT ALL GREEN IS GOOD. For instance, those prolific, green vines tightly twisted around park trees and bushes, *definitely are not good.* They are what Montgomery Parks staff members call non- native invasives—or simply, plants not from the area that are quickly taking over and negatively impacting the park lands and wildlife.

Enter the Weed Warriors. Created in 1999, the Weed Warrior Program “empowers our community members in Montgomery County to help Montgomery Parks staff manage the non-native invasive plants on the park lands,” said Corinne Stephens, Senior Natural Resources Specialist, Montgomery Parks.

Through e-courses and in-person training, Weed Warrior volunteers are taught to properly identify and manage specific species of non-native invasive plants. Dick Kerr, a fully trained and certified Weed Warrior Supervisor, has helped clear Wyngate Woods Neighborhood Park of non- native invasives for more than 15 years. “After an hour or two of work, you see visibly what you’ve done,” said Dick. “And then you come back the next day, the next week and the next year... You know you’ve done something good for the natural world.”

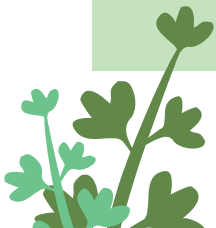
“The most exciting thing for them is to plant new things and keep an eye on them,” explains Corinne Stephens. “Volunteers love this!”

Understanding the importance of attracting volunteers, Weed Warrior Dick Kerr also donates money to the cause. Administered by the Montgomery Parks Foundation, donations are used to purchase tools for volunteers. Kerr also enjoys knowing more individuals will experience the joy of giving back to nature.

REACHING ALL COMMUNITIES

Many Mountain Bikers “Stoked” about The Pit at Fairland Park

Deep sandy pits, the remains of old mines, often entice mountain bikers . . . and Montgomery County bikers are no exception. So, it is no wonder that local mountain bikers helped transform an old gravel mine into a one-of-a-kind bike skills park in Fairland Recreational Park—aptly named The Pit.

GNARLY. RAD. STOKED. These are just some of the positive reactions from mountain bikers who “dropped in” to The Pit, the new mountain bike skills park at Fairland Recreational Park. With its rollers, kicker ramps, wall rides, drops and skinnies of all types, mountain bikers of all abilities can enjoy the ride.

How did this multi-year project get off the ground? The wheels began spinning at a volunteer construction event held on Fairland Park trails. Bob Turnbull, Montgomery Parks Principal Natural Resources Specialist explains, “There was a large mountain bike contingency willing to lend their weekends to help us build stuff or maintain trails. . . . This project was a request from a local bike group.”

A bike park vision is one thing; making it a reality is another. Maryland House Majority Leader Delegate Eric Luedtke, State Senator Craig Zucker (Maryland

District 14) and the Montgomery Parks Foundation secured a \$100,000 legislative bond to help fund the bike park construction.

Kem Chavez, Montgomery County resident, trail liaison and avid mountain biker, attended

the October 29, 2022 ribbon-cutting ceremony. What did Kem think of the completed mountain bike park? “In mountain bike language, I was *stoked!* Fairland is literally in my backyard!”

Word has spread. In and out-of-state mountain bikers are sharing their exciting first rides at The Pit on YouTube. Kem Chavez commented enthusiastically, “I drive by every day. The lot is always full. People are *really* enjoying it!”

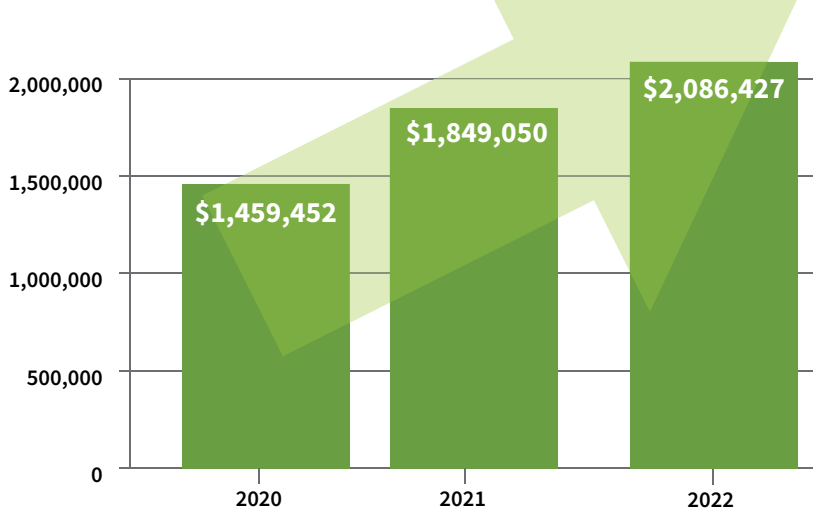
