FOUNDATION GRANT

Montgomery County has a vast park system! To keep our parks in tip-top shape, the Volunteer Service Office (VSO) relies on dedicated volunteers to ensure parks remain clean and safe, but there's always much more to do. That's where the Foundation comes into play.

In December, the Foundation's Board of Trustees reviewed grant applications and chose six outstanding park projects to support. We proudly announce that the Foundation awarded VSO's Step-Up Clean-Up project a sizeable grant in January 2023 to enhance their efforts.



Step-Up Clean-Up Project

The Step-Up Clean-Up project aims to increase the number of clean-ups in thirty-four equity focus areas (EFAs). In May, VSO hired Dawson Pennypacker as the Volunteer Programs Assistant for parks located in EFAs. Within his first three months of employment, he helped manage **36 clean-ups** and led **290 volunteers**, removing **153 bags of trash** and **43 bags of recycling**. The Foundation is thrilled to support impactful projects like this that help create healthy and vibrant parks for all!

"Serene, beautiful, and makes me feel good!" That is how long-time visitor and volunteer of Brookside Gardens, Christine McNerney describes Brookside Gardens. After moving to Montgomery County from New York in the mid-1980s, Christine discovered beauty in the local neighborhood park she could walk to with her friends and family. Brookside Gardens, with its diverse green spaces, family-friendly programming, and special events, quickly became one of her favorite places to spend her free-time.

Christine saw the value that Brookside Gardens provided the larger Montgomery County community, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic. During this time, the number of visitors to the park increased substantially. Community members were looking for fun, safe places to get outside, play and explore – Brookside Gardens was a clear answer to meet these needs.

However, with this increase in visitors, Christine noticed that her beloved Brookside was experiencing more wear-and-tear than normal. She recognized that *Brookside had a greater need than what they received from government funding* and decided to become a monthly donor through the Montgomery Parks Foundation's Seedling Society. Christine appreciates that she can choose to register as a monthly donor so she can "set it and forget it." Having her donations auto-donate each month makes it easier for her and allows Brookside the additional flexibility to provide for unexpected needs when they arise!

Monthly gifts ensure that nature centers can continue to introduce the next generation of naturalists to the world around them. ASK AN EXPERT! A Living Classroom

While driving down the main road into Black Hill Regional Park, you may have noticed two modular structures sitting in an old maintenance yard. If you have ever wondered what is being built there, our resident expert, Jennifer Scully explains.

What is a SEED Classroom? SEED stands for Sustainable Education Every Day. Our SEED Classroom is a modular building that will be powered by solar panels and collect rainwater to water a living wall and flush our composting toilet. Some building components will be exposed to help students learn about green architecture and technologies!

Why is it being built at Black Hill Regional Park? Black Hill Visitor Center and Nature Programs has approximately 45,000 visitors per year, which includes over 1,600 students who come to the visitor center to have meaningful experiences in nature. The visitor center is not set up to host large groups, so we have been lobbying and fundraising for ten years to have a private space to better serve schools, community groups, and local organizations interested in environmental programming.

How will naturalists use the SEED Classroom? The park naturalists will run our forest preschool program out of the SEED Classroom 2 to 3 times per week. We will also host our summer camps there when it is operational. We are most excited about offering STEM and climate change-focused programming for students because they will be able to use real-time data that is generated by the classroom!

Why is it important to have a SEED Classroom in our community? The SEED Classroom will offer several green solutions to living in a changing climate. It is our hope that visitors will be inspired by the classroom and want to incorporate some of these green technologies in their own homes. The classroom will provide a one-of-a-kind space for learning, gathering, and exploring creative solutions for the future.
